Save Farm Terrace - their day in court!

At the end of June 2014, the Harrow in LEAF committee welcomed a delegation from Watford's Farm Terrace Campaign to discuss allotment protection and to make a donation to help with legal fees in their stand for "all allotments".

To remind everyone, the Save Farm Terrace campaign is <u>not</u> just a local Watford issue it really is a national issue. The rate of closure of allotments at this time in the UK is alarming!

On Friday 25th July their case was heard at the High Court, Westminster. The court room was packed with allotment supporters and outside a demo was held with people dressed for the occasion carrying tools and vegetables and a scarecrow of Eric Pickles! We expect a decision soon.

The case appears to hinge on whether the Government made the right decision about a Health Campus and Housing Complex, based on the information they were provided by Watford's Council and Mayoress. It has now come to light that 20% of the planned space will be for a car park for Watford Football Club!!!!

Can we help you to make Harrow greener?

We are happy to report that as part of our initiative we have provided financial support to three horticultural projects in Harrow run entirely by local volunteers.

Our committee selected the following 3 projects to help so far:

- Ted Bamford and his campaign to bring flowers back to Pinner shopping centre. See photograph.
- A Stanmore Group, spokesperson Rex Holmes, tidying up a corner in Stanmore with wood chips to reduce weeds.
- Welldon Activity Group to build raised beds at Newton Park allotments which their disabled clients can use.

William Shakespeare, agriculturist and tax dodger!

William was born 450 years ago in 1564 and in our Show this year we celebrate this fact in our People's Choice exhibits.

Will was the son of John Shakespeare, a respected agriculturist and dealer in Stratford upon Avon, and so during his life would have grown up and become very familiar with the world of plants and sodbusters.

His plays and poetry are full of references to gardens and flowers and are oft used to symbolise human emotions or political actions. He would have had a great knowledge and interest in the land, gardening and associated plants.

In fact, on retirement from London and play writing, he returned home to take over the family agriculture business and it is said he became a "ruthless businessman and tax dodger" who stored grain at a time of famine to maximise his profits.



The Gardener's Speech

Act III, Scene 4 from *Richard II* by William Shakespeare (1597)

Gardener. Go, bind thou up yon dangling apricocks, Which, like unruly children, make their sire Stoop with oppression of their prodigal weight: Give some supportance to the bending twigs. Go thou, and like an executioner, Cut off the heads of too fast growing sprays, That look too lofty in our commonwealth: All must be even in our government. You thus employ'd, I will go root away The noisome weeds, which without profit suck The soil's fertility from wholesome flowers.

It is likely that Will used *The Gardener's Labyrinth* (London 1577) to design his Knott Garden at his retirement home New Place, Stratford which together with Anne Hathaway's Cottage have interesting gardens to visit.

Shakespeare Gardens became very popular from the mid-19th century onwards and are gardens that use and cultivate all the plants mentioned in Will's plays and sonnets and are usually open to public visits. Many are in the USA though!

"What's in a name? That which we call a rose, By any other name would smell as sweet."

Hello to our two newest Associate Societies:

Harrow in LEAF is very pleased that Harrow Natural History Society and Harrow Friends of the Earth have elected to become group members in 2014.

The Harrow Natural History Society was formed in 1970 with the aim of fostering interest in natural history and related subjects with particular emphasis on the flora and fauna of sites within the London Borough of Harrow. Members are active in preservation and conservation of wildlife, particularly of the Harrow Green Belt and other areas of interest and beauty within the borough.

Meetings are held on the second Monday of every month from September to April at the Blackwell Hall, Uxbridge Road, near All Saints Church. During the winter months meetings include illustrated talks by visiting specialist speakers and discussions and talks by members of their own Society. The Society also organises walks and visits to places of natural history interest, both local and further afield, with at least one outing every month throughout the year.

Wiseacre Grand Opening on July 16th 2014

On the 16th July 2014 a garden party was held at Wiseworks, the mental health charity on Marlborough Hill, to officially open their renovated Wiseacre site following an award of Big Lottery funding.

Harrow in LEAF were represented at this opening by Diana Dolman who reports:

"The team at Wiseworks have transformed the overgrown and rubbish-strewn site into a beautiful garden, Wiseacre. The horticultural team, Melinda Wright and John Heath, are to be congratulated. They and all those who put in so much are justifiably proud of the results of a tremendous amount of hard work. There is a pond and attractive flower beds, places to sit, and a thriving vegetable plot with raised beds, which is producing wonderful crops. At the opening there was an exhibition of very high quality photographs of plants, taken by clients, as well as pictures of the development of the site. The garden was opened by the mayor in the presence of staff, clients, past clients and volunteers, many of whom are past clients. They are always looking for more volunteers to help."

Welcome to my site - Greenhill allotments visit

This is the first of an occasional article focusing on a particular allotment site in the Harrow area with a view to highlight a little history, allotmenteers, interesting produce and any ideas that we can share with our Harrow in LEAF members.

In June I was very kindly invited by Helen Shorter, our HiL Rep., to the Greenhill Allotment Site situated between Grange Road and Richards Close HA1 2PP. Helen has held an allotment here for 30 years and knows the site well.

In 1974 the site was reduced by 50% to allow for the building of sheltered accommodation leaving about 54 plots, although Helen believes it has reduced further owing to waterlogging of some plots.

Walking round, the allotmenteers were, as expected, very friendly and keen to share their experiences. I tasted white currants for the first time and marvelled at engineer John's space age hut in the middle that was powered by the sun!

I learnt a lot from "Jocki" Mitrovic about his passion for grafting fruits and roses which he has done for many years. He grows 4 kinds of figs – from his homeland Croatia, from Turkey and Portugal but his recommendation is Cyprus figs. He made grafting sound very easy - so to get good quality crops it is worth a go!

Also on site that day was Jo Stephenson, our 2013 Best Floral Art prize winner! Jo is a journalist and a comedienne, who occasionally performs her allotment orientated show "Can you dig it?" around the country. Jo uses a couple of bath tubs filled with compost to grow good and straight carrots and parsnips, and loves artichoke. We discussed her attempts to "force" rhubarb with an inherited terracotta pot, but she decided an upturned plastic bin was best. Forced rhubarb is much more tender and sweet.
